Thank you to all the families who attended parent teacher interviews last week to meet with your child's teacher. Over the course of the two afternoons and evenings teachers in our six Year 2 - 8 classes hosted 146 interviews.

Garden to Table

Last Thursday in our gardening time we went to check on our remaining hue (gourds) growing in our garden. While out in the garden we came upon three interesting looking mushrooms.

We brought them inside to look at them more closely. We placed two in a container on two pieces of paper – a black piece of paper and a white piece of paper. Using the two different colours of paper we thought that if the mushrooms dropped spores we could see the spores on one of the sheets of paper depending on the colour of spores they dropped.



We thought the mushrooms might be wood blewits after talking with Tess about them. We did some research on wood blewits and found a video about them. We learnt that blewit was an old word for blue. We also learnt that mushrooms have gills.

The mushrooms did release some spores which were a purple but we still aren't sure if the mushrooms were actually wood blewits.

ALLERGY AWARENESS

We have a child with severe and life-threatening allergies in our school.

This child is highly allergic to hazel nuts, brazil nuts and walnuts.

This means that we are asking all our families to please ensure that you do not send Hazel Nuts, Brazil Nuts or Walnuts to school for your children. This includes Nutella as this has a high content of Hazel Nuts, and any other sandwich spread that contains Hazel Nuts, Brazil Nuts or Walnuts.

We already have a policy of children not sharing food at lunchtime but the concern for this child with allergies is that a class mate may have some of the nut or nut spread on their hands and then touch something subsequently used by this allergic child. This could cause a life-threatening allergic response.

The Game in the Dark


