Our rūmaki reo mornings are an opportunity for us to speak as much Māori as possible while the students enjoy being in mixed age groups playing a game together. On Wednesday we were lucky to be supported by a number of people who took lead roles in running an activity including Esther and Jacob, Monica and Scott from Wellington Basketball, and Kiri from Wellington hockey. Biennially our senior students at Years 7 & 8 have a noho marae experience when they stay away for two nights and three days. Being on the marae is an opportunity for the students to apply some of their te reo and tikanga Māori learning. During their time away they also have opportunities to visit both cultural and historical places in Upper Hutt; and to challenge themselves physically when they go ice skating and trampolining.

I really enjoyed being able to play in Maidstone Park. The spider web swing was so much fun to play on. It could spin and go quite fast. Nachos on our first night was so yummy. 
