Cars on the school drive

On the school drive, over the past fortnight, there have been two incidents where we could have had people in our school community injured. I urge you to please drive with care on the drive. Thank you to the families who are slowing down on the drive. Thank you too to the families who are not parking on the lefthand side bend at the top of the drive. Leaving your car in the middle of the top car park blocks other parents and whanau from leaving the car park. We are waiting on additional yellow lines being painted on the drive to help us better manage safety on the drive.

It is very noticeable that we have increased numbers of cars on the drive after school. If you are collecting a child who is in Year 4 - 8 it would help us to reduce traffic on the drive by:

- Meeting or picking up your child off the school site. Your child could walk down Buller Street to meet you or they could walk down to Victoria Street or Willis Street to meet you.
- You could also arrange to arrive here at school to collect them after the rush. You could arrive at 3.10pm or 3.15pm when there is little traffic on the drive. Your child could wait for you up on the top playground or in the top shelter shed. If it is wet they can stand under cover outside Tessa, Mathew, Ray and Meena's classes facing the car park. They will be able to see you arrive to collect them.

Your child's learning and Seesaw

Since our last newsletter I hope that you have enjoyed viewing and responding to the Seesaw posts teachers and students have made about their recent learning. It was great to see that we have some new grandparents and whanau signed up to see Seesaw.

Garden to Table news



In Garden to Table we have been researching native birds. We did some research on the ruru (morepork) and the kōtare (kingfisher). We recorded our information on two recording sheets. Using the sheets helped us to record what we already knew about each of the birds and what questions we still had about



them. We recorded what we discovered about the birds on our second recording sheet. Using these recording sheets helped us to organise our ideas before creating our Google slides. The recording sheets are a brainstorming technique. - Thea and Tova



Wintering the bees is when you take the top boxes off the hive. This helps the bees as they have less space to warm up over winter. If we didn't do this it would be like putting two heaters in a house that was one kilometre in length and the heaters wouldn't heat the house up at all. - Archie

Before winter we need to take the honey from the hives. Thursday was the first time I have ever worked with bees. The bees flew around us. You could hear them. They were so loud. It was good wearing a bee suit. - Rhys

With Claire, the beekeeper, we took some levels out of the bee hives. As we are going into winter and there could be storms and strong winds we need to take some layers off the hives so they don't fall over. This is called wintering the hive. - Mohamad.

Local History

Our Year 7 & 8 students in Rūma Pohutukawa have been extending their local history knowledge. Over the past week they have undertaken some research around some of our local streets and how they were named.

Maarama Crescent. Marama is obviously Māori but what does it mean though? Well, Maarama means 'moon'. Translated it means moon crescent street. Maarama was named after the pa that was on the hill above Aro Street. - Eli, Sophia, Maxamad



Honiana Te Puni Street is one of our local streets. For many years, until just last year in May, it was called Epuni Street. In May 2024 it was rightfully renamed. Honiana Te Puni was a Te Atiawa leader. He was recognised as a leader because he and another chief/leader from Te Atiawa signed an agreement to sell land to the New Zealand Company. Honiana also traded food to get warm clothes to supply his village. Honiana died in December 1870. There is also a reserve named after him in Petone. - Delson, Rico, Rose, Josie and Daniela.

Ghuznee Street is named after the battle of Ghuznee (Ghazni) which took place in Afghanistan in 1839 during the first Anglo-Afghan war. All of the houses on the northern side of Ghuznee Street have been demolished. Ghuznee Street is a street that has great food, street art, shopping and even a boutique hotel. - Izzy, Jay and Lane
