I have enjoyed learning new water safety skills. I have to admit that free time is the best! I'm looking forward to kayaking. I've got a little experience kayaking as my Aunt showed me how to paddle. - Matai

Swimming last year and this year has been so different from previous years now that they have introduced learning water safety skills like wearing life jackets. The life jackets feel quite heavy to wear as they are so full of water. We have practised making a circle by holding onto other people's life jackets. Making a circle makes us more visible in the water if we needed to be rescued. We have also learnt to make a chain by linking up and then lying back in the water. In the chain we kick and we move in the direction of the person's head at the top of the chain. The last swimmer kicks to move the group through the water. Others in the middle of the chain also help by using a frog kick to help move the group in the water. - Lane

Pink Shirt Day!


