
Visiting author

On Wednesday morning Adam and Anna had arranged for Eirlys Hunter, a local author, to visit our school and to talk with two groups of students. Before morning tea Eirlys spoke to Anna's class and after morning tea she talked to our Year 7 and 8 students.

last term. I liked how Eirlys
talked about the making of
her book. She told us how
much she really liked maps.
She explained that at
university she studied
geography.

In writing The Mapmakers' Race she wanted a character that could fly. She said she wanted all her characters to be different. She said she had written lists of things that would be hard for the characters to do. Eirlys said it had taken her around seven years to write and publish this book. — Zoja
