Many thanks to Cathie who organised our fantastic Cultural Celebration Day last Tuesday. This annual event (previously known as Race Relations Day) is a real highlight of the school year. Students and staff enjoyed the morning learning about some of the different cultures within our school community. I was lucky enough to accompany Group 15 to their two presentations - one was with Paul (Zoe's Dad) and the second was with Somayeh and Mohammad (Alan's Mum and Dad). Paul took us on a trip around the USA where we got to see some very beautiful scenery from across the country. Paul also showed us some fascinating migration maps of the States showing the many groups who have migrated to the States through the 1900s to 2025. Fatih, in my group, was fascinated to visually see the changing migrations from southern and eastern Europe (Italy, Greece) to then Germany and Ireland; and more recently from Mexico, Cuba, China, India and the Philippines. With Somayeh and Mohammad we had a great introduction to Kurdish culture where we danced together and learnt some Kurdish words.

The changing Spring weather impacted on our Year 4 - 8 students heading to the Central Zone Athletics competition which was postponed from last week to this coming week. We wish our athletes all the best as they head to Newtown Park on Tuesday.

Teachers have been taking every opportunity, when the weather has allowed, to get their classes outside for PE lessons and reading in the shade.

We have started to learn to play hockey. We learnt in our first lesson how to correctly hold the hockey stick. I have my right hand low on the stick and my left hand is further up the stick. By doing that it means we can control the ball - Esin

Meeting with our Māori students

I met with our fourteen Māori students last week and they shared their thoughts with me about whether they could see that we valued teo ao and te reo Māori at our school. I asked them if visitors to our school would see and hear that we value teo ao and te reo Māori. The students shared these thoughts with me:

- We have rumaki reo mornings and people like the Mayor know we hold these mornings as she visited us for one rumaki reo morning
- We have weekly kapa haka time and the kapa haka group performed at the Aro Fair



- We celebrate Matariki up at school. We cooked a hangi for that night.
- We sing waiata in our class, at our Friday assembly and hui time and at our mihi whakatau.
- We say karakia at the start and end of the day. We say karakia before kai. We say a karakia at our mihi whakatau.
- We welcome people to our school with a mihi whakatau. We welcome new students and their families. We welcome guests to our school with a mihi whakatau. Children and staff do the welcome speeches which they speak in Māori.
- Every Thursday we have a te reo Māori lesson.
- Every Friday we have te reo Māori lessons.
- Our seniors (Years 7 & 8) stay on a marae every second year. We went to Orongomai Marae this year.
- Every morning in our class we learn some new kupu when we start the day.
- You hear Māori spoken at our school.
- You see Māori on our school signs and on our certificates.
- Our Māori language celebration is not just for one week. We celebrate it for 3 4 weeks. We try to get our families celebrating too by having things for us to do at home.
- We have a display by the office with the new te reo Māori we are learning.
- I think you can see in the art work that we do value te ao Māori.
- I think we need to keep on doing what we are doing when it comes to welcoming new people and visitors; and learning te reo Māori.
- I think we probably could improve our pronunciation of some Māori words.
- When it comes to learning about the history of Aotearoa I would like to learn more than just about Parihaka.
- On the whole things are pretty good here at Te Aro when it comes to learning te reo Māori.
- Maybe we could have a Māori teacher like we have a Chinese person who teaches Mandarin.

Playing futsal

On Thursday afternoon, after school, I went to watch our Year 5 & 6 futsal team play at Akau Tangi Sports Centre.
